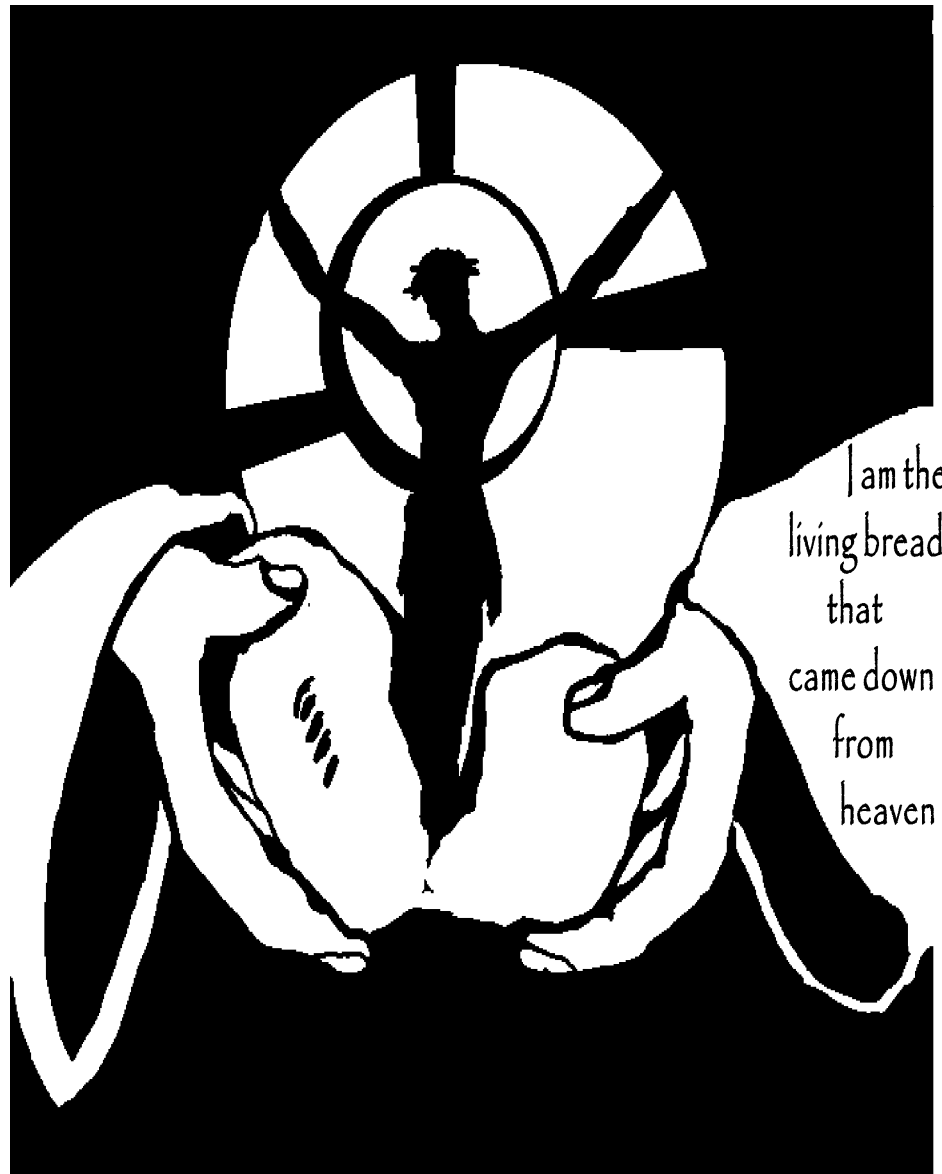

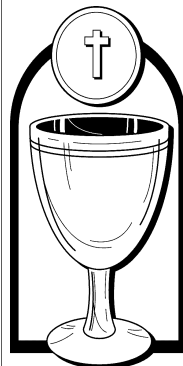

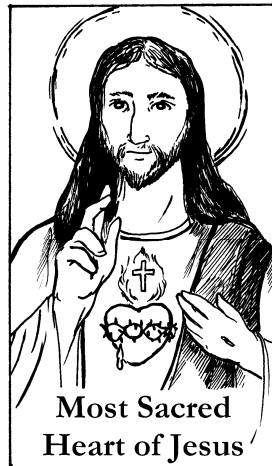

ON GIVING BLOOD, AND CORPUS CHRISTI

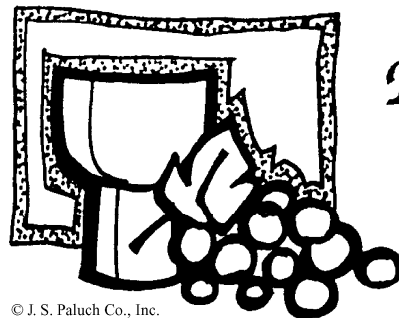

People who know me know that I'm squeamish when it comes to blood, mine or anybody else's. I'm cool with blood as long as it's where it's supposed to be. Like, in me, or in you, or in all of us. It's the spilled blood that I have issue with, even when it's spilled in a good way. When my wife was pregnant years ago with our first child, my work colleagues didn't immerse themselves in the usual game of predicting the baby's birth date or sex or weight. Instead, they placed odds on whether or not I'd pass out in the delivery room. I did not, by the way. And I made it through Gail's delivery of our second child three years later, but blood-letting is still un-nerving to me.

Just the same, I've been looking forward to each (controlled) blood-letting opportunity to come my way ever since I learned a while back that I'm just a few pints shy of my 100th donation. It's not that I enjoy giving. In fact, I joke often that I do it only for the cookies. In truth, I keep giving because from my first pint onward, I knew it was the right thing to do. I read somewhere once that since blood is meant to circulate, we should pass it around. This made sense to me then, and it makes sense to me now. I'm scheduled to give my 97th donation in early June, so if I stay healthy, I'll be giving my 100th pint in December. Not a huge deal, certainly, but I feel good about it.

And I feel good about it because even without much medical knowledge, I know that the blood I give is put to important use. Per information on the LifeSource website, for example, it's used for car accident victims who can need a lot of blood (fifty pints or more) in the moment. It's used for transplant patients who can require a lot of blood in the moment, too. And there are smaller but on-going needs as well: "Some patients with complications from severe sickle cell disease...receive blood transfusions every month, up to four units at a time." I am happy to give because I can. Also, I know that I may be on the receiving end of somebody else's life-giving donation someday.

And speaking of live-giving donations, today we celebrate the life-giving donation that tops all life-giving donations: the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi). As my *Missalette* puts it, "We usually associate this feast with the presence of Christ found in the consecrated host, the bread of life. Today's readings, however, draw our attention to the blood of Christ and its meaning for our lives." The author of the Letter to the Hebrews tells us that the blood of Christ will "cleanse our consciences from dead works to worship the living God." And Jesus himself tells us, "This is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many." And what, precisely is that covenant? It's the new relationship between God and human-kind, not formed by the blood of sacrificed animals sprinkled here and sprinkled there, but by the blood of Jesus the Christ poured out for all of us on that first Good Friday. Even without the cookies, giving blood is a good thing. And once upon a time, it was *such* a good thing that it is beyond my very comprehension.

An essential work of priests is to **bless**. What exactly does this blessing mean? In

Students in our 6th and 7th grades recently visited the Challenger Learning Center on the Purdue University Calumet campus. Their mission was to "Rendezvous with a Comet" as students performed specific tasks on a simulated Space Station and at Mission Control. Students studied space navigation, mission communication, performed medical tests, operated robotic arms, assembled a comet probe and tested samples of space meteoroids. Teamwork was emphasized throughout the morning mission. It was a terrific experience for all the students and they can't wait to return for a new space adventure. The mission was part of a junior high astronomy unit.
